**PROCLAMATION AND CONTINUED DECLARATION OF EMERGENCY
BY
MAYOR GERARDO SANCHEZ OF THE CITY OF SAN LUIS, ARIZONA
July 7, 2021
COVID-19**

Occupancy of the City's Facilities In-Door Spaces

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, by the Mayor's emergency proclamation and City Council Order No. 2020-6, a determination and state of emergency was declared and ordered due to the COVID-19 pandemic; and

Yuma County COVID-19 Conditions and CDC Recommendations

WHEREAS, in Yuma County, the COVID-19 cases went on a decline after January 19, 2021, and have remained in the moderate to low level since March of 2021, according to the Arizona Department of Health Services ("ADHS") dashboard graph of COVID-19 Cases by Day for Yuma County at <https://azdhs.gov/covid19/data/index.php#confirmed-by-day>; and

WHEREAS, ADHS reported the Yuma County School Benchmarks for the week ending June 26, 2021, show the level of community spread of COVID-19 to be "Low Transmission" according to the latest data available on July 6, 2021, at the ADHS website <https://azdhs.gov/covid19/index.php#schools-dashboard>; and

WHEREAS, on July 6, 2021, ADHS reported 46.1% of the Yuma County Population at <https://azdhs.gov/covid19/data/index.php#vaccine-admin>; and

WHEREAS, on May 13, 2021, CDC recommended that fully vaccinated people can resume both indoor and outdoor activities without wearing a mask or physically distancing; and

WHEREAS, the CDC recommendations do *not* supersede federal, local, tribal, or business and workplace requirements, including, but not limited to, Arizona Governor Executive Order 2021-09 prohibiting cities from requiring individuals to provide documentation regarding their COVID-19 vaccination status as a condition of entering city space or as a condition of receiving city services; and

Legal Authority

WHEREAS, the City of San Luis is within its powers to take measures to protect the health, safety, and welfare of and reduce the harm to the residents and visitors within its city limits from the spread of COVID-19 and other diseases, specifically its public health, safety and welfare powers (also known as police powers) as a political subdivision of the State of Arizona, as those powers are reserved to the states under the Tenth Amendment of the Constitution of the United States; and

WHEREAS, A.R.S. § 9-240(B) (20) and (22) give the city the power to take any action and prescribe regulations, which may be necessary or expedient for the prevention or suppression of disease; and

WHEREAS, the recitations made in the Declarations of Emergency issued by the City of San Luis on March 13, 2020, and March 18, 2020, recite that all levels of government are taking steps to mitigate the harms posed by COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, A.R.S. § 26-311; San Luis City Code § 2.05.040 "Powers and Duties of the Mayor," San Luis City Code § 2.05.020 "Vice Mayor," empower the Mayor of the City of San Luis, or Vice Mayor in the Mayor's absence or disability, to declare a local emergency exists; and

WHEREAS, A.R.S. Title 26, Chapter 2, Article 1, San Luis City Code § 2.05.040(A)(5) and the October 9, 2019, San Luis Emergency Operations Plan, Basic Plan II(E), Page 6, authorize the Mayor to govern by proclamation during an emergency; and

WHEREAS, A.R.S. § 9-276(A)(1) empowers cities to regulate the use, open or vacate parks and public grounds; and

WHEREAS, on March 25, 2021, Arizona Governor Douglas A. Ducey issued Executive Order 2021-06, which under Section 3 allows Arizona cities to set and enforce COVID-19 mitigation policies in their own property; and

WHEREAS, on April 19, 2021, Arizona Governor Douglas A. Ducey issued Executive Order 2021-09, which under Sections 1 and 2 prohibit cities from requiring individuals to provide documentation regarding their COVID-19 vaccination status as a condition of entering city space or as a condition of receiving city services; and

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Gerardo Sanchez, Mayor of the City of San Luis, Arizona, by the authority vested in me by law and facts recited above proclaim and order:

1. **Emergency**. The March 13, 2020, Declaration and order of a public health emergency continues in effect.
2. **Definitions**

Acceptable Transmission means "Moderate Transmission" or "Low Transmission" of COVID-19 for the County of Yuma Arizona as determined by the school benchmark indicators reported on the Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS) schools dashboard at <https://azdhs.gov/covid19/index.php#schools-dashboard>.


Public Health means the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS) and the Yuma County Public Health Services District.

3. **Occupancy Level of City Facilities In-Door Spaces**. The March 13, 2020, Declaration and Order No. 2020-6 as amended by prior proclamations are modified as follows:
 - a. On Wednesday, July 7, 2021, city facilities shall be available at 100% occupancy as allowed by the city's Building and Fire Codes, except that in the Council Chambers, the gallery will accommodate 27 to maintain 6-foot distances.
 - b. The San Luis Municipal Court shall continue to follow the court system orders and policies for COVID-19 precautions.
 - c. For the public's safety, the city recommends following the latest applicable COVID-19 guidance of *Public Health*, as defined above. However, as of June 1, 2021, face coverings will not be required of the public on city property.
 - d. Unless permitted by law to do otherwise, staff shall *not* request vaccination documentation for COVID-19 from the public. The city, as an employer, is allowed to inquire of its employees whether or not they are vaccinated.
 - e. If *Acceptable Transmission*, as defined above, ceases, then the orders in this Proclamation will be reassessed.
4. **Face Coverings for City Employees**: The City Manager's June 29, 2021, Executive Order 2021-02 is adopted by this Proclamation allowing vaccinated employees to work and have work breaks without face coverings with proof of vaccination to their immediate supervisors.
5. **City Policy**. The City Manager's Executive Orders on COVID-19 policy shall be reviewed for compliance with this Proclamation and for other desirable changes under the changing COVID-19 conditions.
6. **Conflicting Provisions**. To the extent they do not conflict with this Proclamation, prior proclamations or the Arizona Governor's Executive Orders, this Proclamation and the declarations of emergency, proclamations, and Council orders the City of San Luis issued since March 13, 2020, shall remain in full force and effect for the duration of the declared COVID-19 public health emergency or until lawfully amended or terminated. The City of San Luis abides by all of the Arizona Governor's lawful Executive Orders, including but not limited to Executive Order 2021-06 dated March 25, 2021, which pre-empted all of the emergency proclamations and orders of the City of San Luis except for those concerning the city's facilities and its role as an employer. In the event of any conflict between an


emergency order or proclamation of the City of San Luis and an Arizona Governor's executive order, the provisions of the Governor's executive order shall prevail.

7. **Severability.** If any provision of this Proclamation or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, this invalidity affects no other provision or application of this Proclamation. Those provisions that remain valid shall be given effect without the invalid provision or application. To achieve this purpose, the provisions of this Proclamation are declared to be severable.
8. This proclamation shall remain in effect until lawfully amended, repealed, terminated, or pre-empted and shall be reconsidered as the COVID-19 risks to public health increase or decrease.



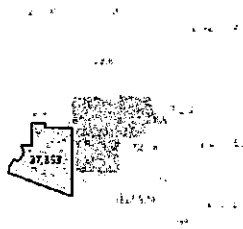

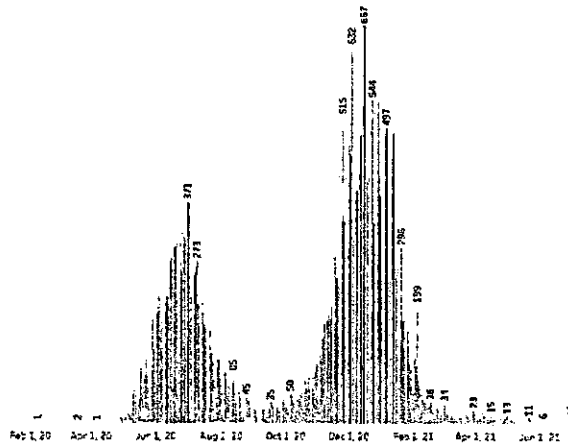


What is an Epi Curve?

An epi curve is a visual display of cases associated with an outbreak by a specific date. In the graph below, the date of specimen collection is used for the date.

Epi Curves may be used to describe an outbreak's time trend or distribution of cases over time, the general shape of the outbreak's magnitude, and the most likely time period of exposure.

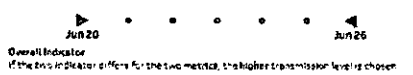

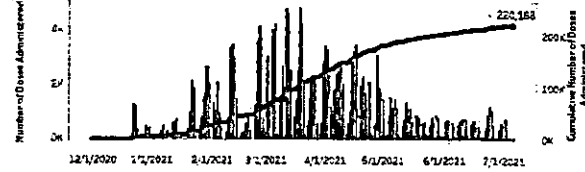
